














AAOS cares about the entire MSK community

Streamlined Bylaws

- Essential set of bylaws codifying only:
 - Illinois state requirements
 - Existence of BOC and BOS groups





- Simplifies all processes
- Decreases the need to revise

What is the difference between Bylaws and Policies?

• <u>Bylaws = Core governance rules</u> defining the organization's structure an operations (public-facing)

• <u>Policies = Operational guidelines</u> for specific situations (internal—facing) e.g. conflict of interest policy

How Did These Changes Come About?

- Governance review at the 2023 Board Workshop
- Legal consultants analyzed for risk and benchmarked AAOS bylaws against high functioning nonprofit boards
- Multiple board discussions over 2 years
- Core Question:

How can we be the most well informed, high functioning board for our members?

 Final concepts approved at the 2/24 BOD meeting at Annual Meeting

How are the new bylaws different?

Bylaws streamlined from 60+ pages to 33 for simplicity and clarity

The only advisory groups codified in the bylaws are the BOC and BOS

Nominating Committee

- Chair: no change
- 4 Elected Fellows (ONLY 1 time not 3)
- 3 BOD members from Governance Committee
- Slate and alternates recommended to BOD
- Draft for skill sets
- BOD members understand current issues
- Institutional memory
- Rarely a candidate issue only BOD knows



A More Representative Nominating Committee!!!

- 6 Board members chosen by BOC and BOS are eligible to serve on the Governance Committee
- Officers (Presidential Line and Treasurer)
 cannot serve on the Governance Committee
- Fellows can be elected to the nominating committee only once
- A candidate slate plus alternates to BOD
- BOD accepts slate unless there is specific issue requiring alternate to be taken



Focus on Active Fellows

 Only Active Fellows vote on all issues and members of the AAOS Nominating Committee



Ensures those most impacted by AAOS actions choose the organization's direction



Emeritus Fellows still contribute through committees and advisory roles



BOC/BOS Representation

- BOS and BOC advisory bodies codified in the new bylaws
- BOC and BOS unchanged in any way (still three Board members from each advisory group who have full voting rights)
- Board composition unchanged







- OrthoPAC is #3 medical PAC in-terms of dollars raised



What's at Stake?

Conversations about U.S. healthcare policy will occur whether we are in the room or not. Our priority is to be at the table and not on the menu. The government decides:

How we are paid

Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act, Merit-based Incentive Payment System

How we practice

Private, employed, academic, government, telemedicine

What we can do

Scope, prior authorization

Who we can treat

In network, out of network, Medicare beneficiaries

What we can own

Hospital, imaging, ambulatory surgery center

Medicare Payment Reform

AAOS Developments

- On Saturday, June 28th, the Senate passed H.R.1, which included a one-year payment increase under the physician fee schedule of 2.5% beginning January 1, 2026.
- The President has now signed the bill into law.
- AAOS continues to advocate for physician payment reform to be included in any viable vehicle.

Prior Authorization Outhorization

Improving Seniors' Timely Access to Care Act (H.R. 3514/S. 1816)

- Reintroduced on May 20
- Currently has 178 House sponsors and 56 Senate sponsors
- Congressional Budget Office (CBO) estimates legislation costs \$0
- Codifies the Advancing Interoperability and Improving Prior Authorization Processes (e-PA) rule that was finalized by CMS in January 2024.

Easing Restrictions on Physician-Led Hospitals

Patient Access to Higher Quality Health Care Act

• Would repeal the ban on physician-led hospitals.

Physician Led and Rural Access to Quality Care Act

- Would allow establishment of physician-led hospitals in rural areas and expansion of existing facilities.
- Introduced in the House and Senate for 119th Congress
- AAOS leading coalition with other physician groups

Facilitating Accountability in Reimbursements (FAIR) Act

Requires separate National Provider Identifier (NPI) numbers for off-campus hospital outpatient departments.

Protecting Musculoskeletal Research Funding

FY 2026 Appropriations

On June 2025, the House Defense Appropriations subcommittee proposed \$700 million for the overall CDMRP program, which is an improvement from the March 2025 Continuing Resolution but still represents a ~54% cut overall to the program from FY 2025. AAOS is now focusing on Senate champions to potentially increase funding for FY 2026.

How was OrthoPAC impactful in the 2024 Election Cycle?
